### **Nursing Studies**

Nursing Studies was the first Nursing Department to be established in a University in Europe. It began in 1956 and 2016 sees the celebration of 60 years of Nursing Studies at the University of Edinburgh. We offer both undergraduate and postgraduate degree programmes, as well as continuing professional development courses. The undergraduate programme is a four year honours programme which leads to a Bachelor of Nursing degree and registration as a nurse (adult branch). This programme has been one of the most consistently highly ranked programmes in the UK since the inception of the rankings tables. The programme is currently ranked 2nd in the UK with an overall score of 96.7% (Guardian University Guide 2016).

There are several postgraduate degree programmes from taught MSc/Diplomas to PhD. The MSc in Advancing Nursing Practice attracts students from around the world for taught postgraduate study whilst the Masters of Nursing in Clinical Research provides a unique experience for both home and international students to learn about nursing research in both theory and practice. Postgraduate research degrees are offered through the MSc by Research, the MPhil and by PhD. These programmes attract students for both full and part-time study and from home and international students. There are a range of scholarship opportunities for PhD study on offer. There is a thriving research student community with 34 research students currently registered.

Nursing Studies also fosters strong links with other disciplines for both teaching and research. There is collaborative teaching for the Bachelor of Nursing with Honours with students in Medicine and also through courses in the Masters programmes. Nursing Studies has strong international links and partnership working through both research and teaching. Students have exchange opportunities with China, Australia and European countries whilst there are also established research partnerships in these countries. Further research and teaching collaborations exist with Malawi, Nepal, South Korea and the USA.

Nursing Studies has excellent long established links with its service partners. These are chiefly NHS Lothian and NHS Borders. We are active partners in an innovative Clinical Academic Research Careers scheme which has led to several postdoctoral and research students being appointed to develop the capacity for research in partnership with service. We currently have schemes running in critical care and in dementia care. Academic staff also have the opportunity to take up honorary clinical contracts with our partners as part of this scheme and they currently have appointments in public health, critical care, older people's care and mental health.

Nursing Studies has a long tradition of being one of the most research active nursing departments in the UK. This position has been endorsed with an excellent result in the Research Exercise Framework (REF) assessment. The staff in Nursing Studies returned in the recent REF into Unit of Assessment 22 (UoA22) - Social Work and Social Policy which reflects our time-honoured affiliations in social science research. Colleagues from several different subject areas in the university came together including those from Public Health, Social Policy and Social Work. This submission into UoA 22achieved overall results of 81% as world leading and internationally excellent, and indicates a research environment which is 100% world-leading. Nursing at Edinburgh has a longstanding history of research collaboration across these disciplines and given the current emphasis on the care integration agenda, this puts us in an excellent position to contribute to the development of this area.

Contributing to the REF assessment were:

- Research outputs (publications) with 72.7% assessed as world leading or internationally excellent in terms of originality, significance and rigour.
- Research impact (the impact of research on the health and well-being of society) with 94.3% assessed as world leading or internationally excellent in terms of reach and significance.
- Research environment (our research students, grants, strategy and infrastructure) with 100% assessed as world leading in terms of vitality and sustainability.

The excellence of the research assessed in UoA22 means that we are third in the UK (by Research fortnight Power Index - a measure of quality and volume) and the top University in this unit of assessment in Scotland.


